- Know what a sculpture is

- Know that the shape of the paper can be changed
- Know that paper strengthens when rolled or layered
- Know that paper can be joined using different materials

- Use a combination of shapes.
 - Create texture through:
 - Curling
 - Coiling
 - Rolling
 - Fringing
 - Folding
- Explore joining materials (glue stick, pva, masking tape)
- Begin to cut own paper in preparation for sculpture
- Use rolled up materials (a range of paper)
- Use sculpting technique to create a sculpture
- Pupils to experience creating sculpture outdoors

- Know that 2D and 3D shapes can be used to create art
- Know that some materials can be shaped and altered
- Know that some sculptures can appear to look like 2D (relief sculpture)

- Use a combination of shapes to create lines.
- Join materials to construct a simple base (glue stick, pva, masking tape)
- Add further materials and join and fasten with the most suitable material
- To cut or bend materials to create a range of shapes
- Use sculpting technique to create a simple 3D sculpture or relief sculpture
- Pupils to experience creating sculpture outdoors

Year 3

- Enrich the pupil's cultural diversity through exposing them to a range of sculptors from past and present
- Evaluate and comment upon work by a range of sculptors from past and present
- To create original piece showing a range of influences and styles

Clay

Augusta Savage Made in clay then cast into bronze



- Know objects have a 3rd dimension
- Know what a sculpture is and know they are created by sculptors and give examples of sculptures
- Know what the term coiling means
- Know about clay tools and their function
- Know which tools to select for different purposes
- Know that patterns and textures can be achieved before the clay dries
- Know that clay can be painted
- Know the difference between wet and dry clay and how this affects how you work with it
- Know which techniques are the most appropriate for joining

- Use a sketchbook to plan, collect and develop ideas (apply sketchbook skills from drawing)
- Construct a 3-dimensional shape using coiling techniques
- Use a range of clay tools or fingers to create a solid structure through pinching and smoothing each join
- Produce some patterns, textures and carvings using a range of clay tools
- Develop an understanding of finishing work through paint or polish
- Pupils to experience creating sculpture outdoors

- To create original piece showing a range of influences and styles

Wire

Suzanne Williams



- Know what a sculpture is and explain why it is a sculpture
- Can comment on the work of some sculptors and give their opinion on their sculptures
- Know that sculptures are made from a variety of materials
- Know that some artists have a preference in the materials that they use
- Know that wire can be manipulated and can revert to its original form
- Know that a wire structure can have stability without the need to add fixing components
- Know that wire is a material that can be altered to represent different forms (movement)

- To use a sketchbook to plan, collect and develop ideas (apply sketchbook skills from drawing)
- Construct a 3-dimensional shape through manipulating material of choice
- Experiment with bending and twisting to create form
- Use bending and twisting techniques to secure and join
- Select a material to create a stable base
- Secure materials to a base and add layers to create a 3D form and movement
- To manipulate sculpture to create desired effect
- Pupils to experience creating sculpture outdoors

- Know that some natural materials need prepping, so they are fit for purpose
- Know how to manipulate materials safely to create a desired effect
- Know that some materials are better than other at securing
- Know that structures can be strengthened by adding components
- Know that visual aesthetics can add a desired effect

- To use a sketchbook to plan, collect and develop ideas (apply sketchbook skills from drawing)
- Construct a 3-dimensional shape through manipulating material of choice
- To prepare material in preparation for use
- Experiment with bending and manipulation to create a range of 2D shapes to create 3D sculptures
- Experiment with materials to secure joins (masking tape, string etc)
- Construct components using effective joining techniques
- Attach components to assemble 3D structure
- Evaluate and modify joins to strengthen the structure
- Use covering materials to create a visual effect (tissue paper, ribbon, crepe paper etc.)
- Pupils to experience creating sculpture outdoors

- Consolidate knowledge of sculptors and sculptures and can appraise their work
- Know how to recreate a sculpture in the style of a chosen artist
- Know the difference between natural and recycled materials
- Know what natural sculptures look like and how they vary across cultures
- Know which recyclable materials to select and know they are fit for purpose
- Know which the most suitable materials are to help strengthen, join, fix and secure a structure made from recycled materials
- Know that a material selected for a project will represent initial ideas
- Know that a design can be altered and improved

- To use a sketchbook to plan, collect and develop ideas (apply sketchbook skills from drawing)
- Take inspiration from environmental art
- Explore a range of recycled materials and how they can be reworked to create an art form.
- Select appropriate recycled material to create a structure
- Construct a 3-dimensional shape using recycled material of choice
- Explore suitable materials to construct, join, fix or secure depending on material type
- Evaluate and modify to strengthen or a create a visual effect
- Select materials to improve design
- Pupils to experience creating sculpture outdoors
